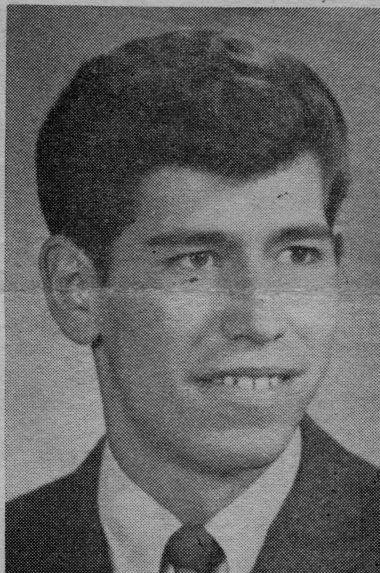

Cherrie has a record of being one of the first to arrive at Platte Valley Academy each fall and being one of the last to leave school all four of her years here.

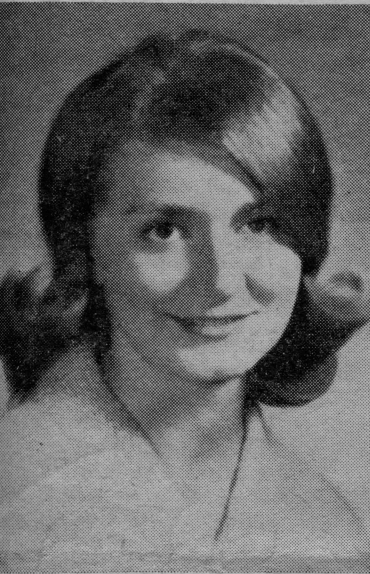
Cherrie's future plans are divided between becoming a secretary or home economist.

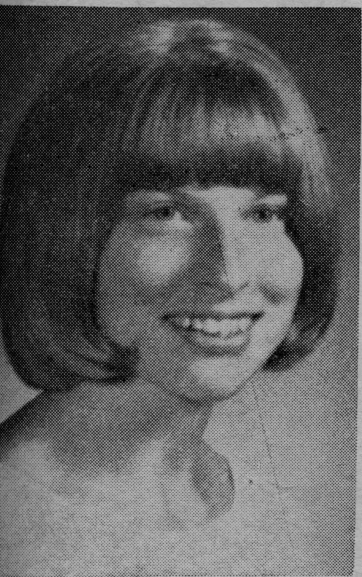
"Lullaby dear Louie" . . . and he was off to dream land.

Maybe Ron's experience as the Aquila business manager will be a valuable experience in training to become a computer operator.

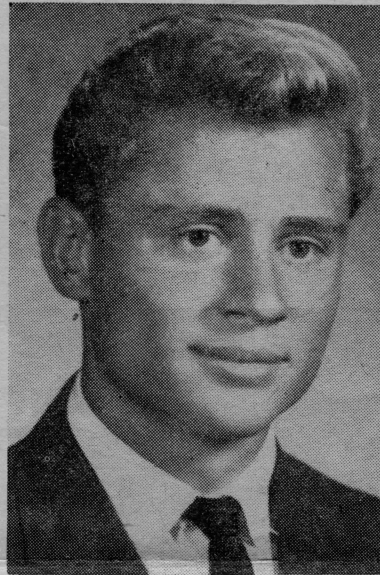

This year she spoke in our Voice of Youth meetings and was a student Week of Prayer speaker. Also, Sherry held a Temperance office.



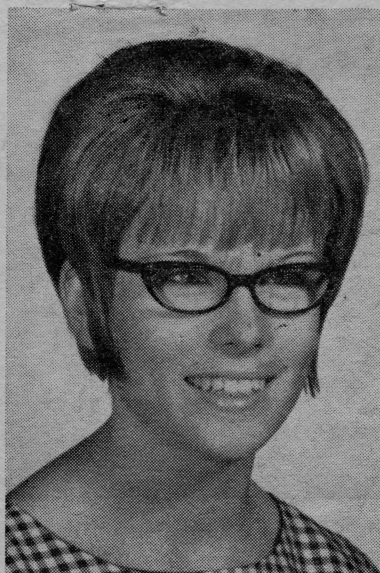

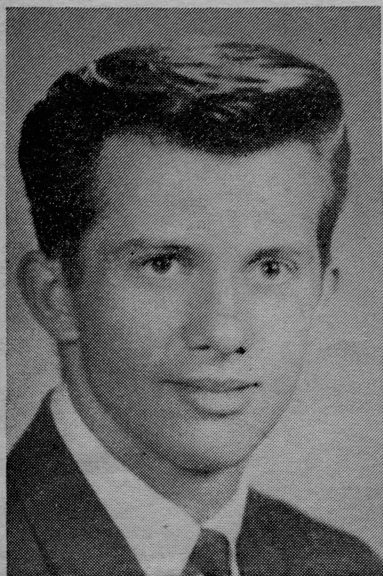


Broken Bow, Nebraska, sent to us Karen Sanders, who helped lead the Freshmen-Senior City Slickers to victory in our Bus Campaign.
